Susan B. Anthony (1820-1906): A leading figure in the movement, known for her tireless organizing and activism, and co-founder of the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA) with Elizabeth Cady Stanton.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton (1815-1902): A key intellectual and writer in the movement, known for her speeches and writings, and co-founder of the NWSA with Susan B. Anthony.

Lucy Stone (1818-1893): A prominent advocate for women's rights and co-founder of the American Woman Suffrage Association (AWSA).

Alice Paul (1885-1977): A leader in the militant wing of the suffrage movement, known for her activism and founding the National Woman's Party (NWP).

Carrie Chapman Catt (1859-1947): A prominent leader in the suffrage movement, known for her organizational skills and as president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA).

Ida B. Wells-Barnett (1862-1931): An African American journalist, suffragist, and civil rights activist.

Mary Church Terrell (1863-1954): An African American suffragist, civil rights activist, and educator.

Sojourner Truth (1797-1883): An African American abolitionist and women's rights activist.

Frances E.W. Harper (1825-1911): An African American poet, abolitionist, and suffragist.

Lucretia Mott (1793-1880): A key figure in the early women's rights movement and a prominent abolitionist.

Julia Ward Howe (1819-1910): Author of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" and a prominent suffragist.

Harriet Tubman (1822-1913): An abolitionist and conductor on the Underground Railroad, who also supported women's suffrage.

Harriet Beecher Stowe (1811-1896): Author of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" and a supporter of women's suffrage.

Helen Keller (1880-1968): An author, political activist, and supporter of women's suffrage.
